The ideal flag for an Embassy in the smallest room

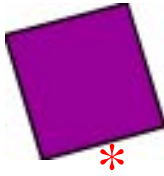

Work in garter stitch throughout (Every row knit)

Start each shape at *

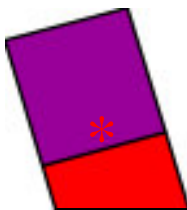


Using purple, cast on 7 stitches

Knit 14 rows

Break off purple

(This square should measure approximately 3.5 cm, if the cover is to fit. It is better too small than too big as the cover will stretch sufficiently when you put it over the toilet roll)



Join in red

Knit 3 rows

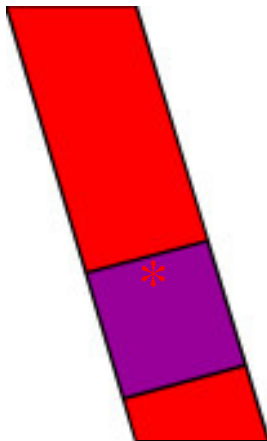
Next row: knit 2; Turn

Next row: knit

Next row: knit 5; Turn

Next row: knit

Leave the stitches on a stitch holder



Using red, pick up 7 stitches from (cast on) edge

Knit 24 more rows

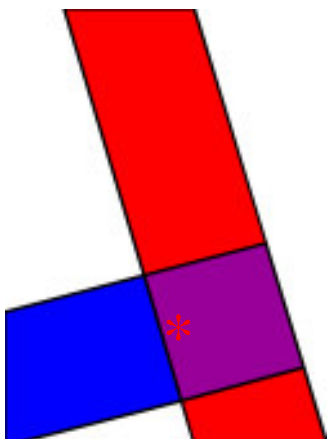
Next row: knit 2; Turn

Next row: knit

Next row: knit 5; Turn

Next row: knit

Leave the stitches on a stitch holder



Using blue, pick up one stitch from the end of each garter stitch ridge, on the edge shown (7 stitches)

Knit 14 more rows

Next row: knit 2; Turn

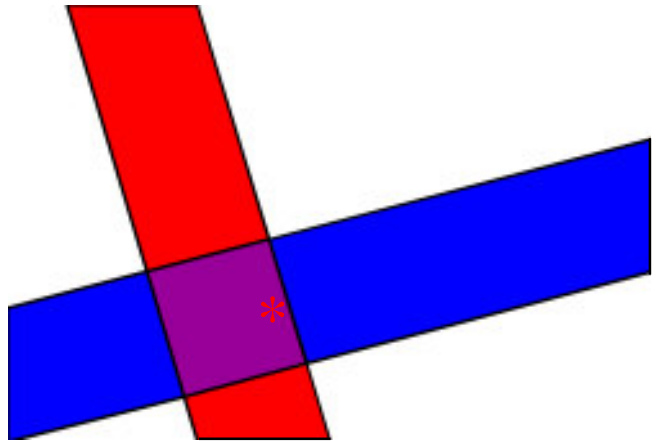
Next row: knit

Next row: knit 5; Turn

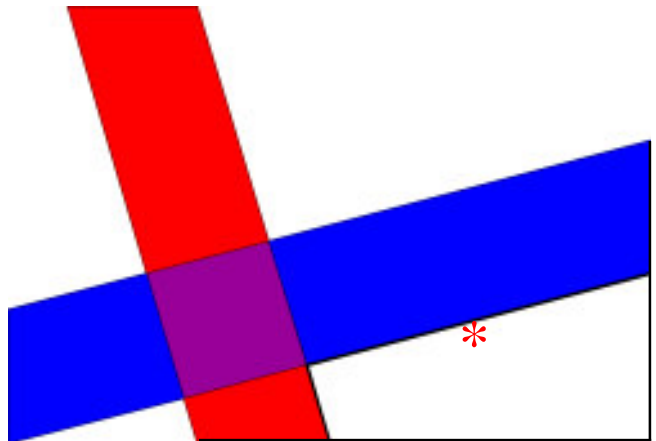
Next row: knit

Cast off loosely

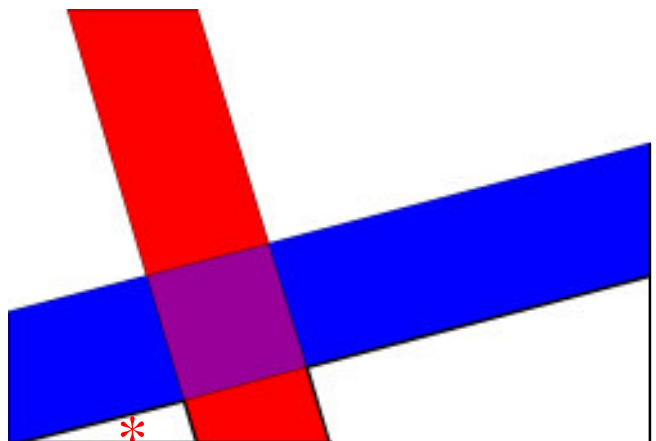
Using blue, pick up one stitch from the end of each garter stitch ridge, on the edge shown (7 stitches)
 Knit 36 more rows
 Next row: knit 2; Turn
 Next row: knit
 Next row: knit 5; Turn
 Next row: knit
 Cast off loosely

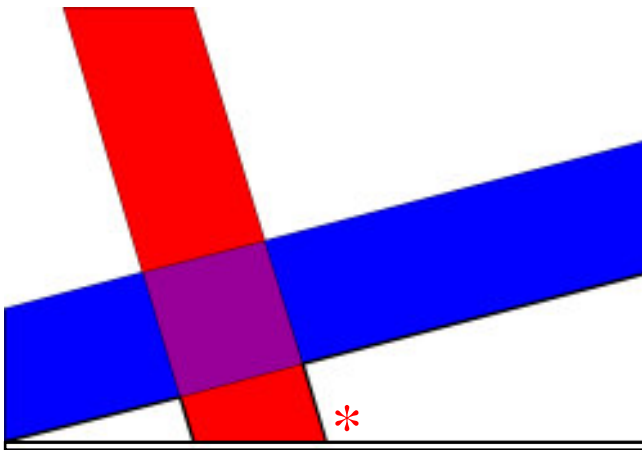


Using white, pick up one stitch from the end of each garter stitch ridge, on the edge shown (19 stitches)
 Knit 5 more rows
 Next row: knit to last 2 stitches, knit 2 together
 Next row: knit to last 3 stitches; Turn
 Next row: knit
 Next row: knit to last 6 stitches; Turn
 Next row: knit
 Next row: knit to last 9 stitches; Turn
 Next row: knit
 Next row: knit to last 12 stitches; Turn
 Next row: knit
 Next row: knit to last 15 stitches; Turn
 Next row: knit
 Leave stitches on a stitch holder

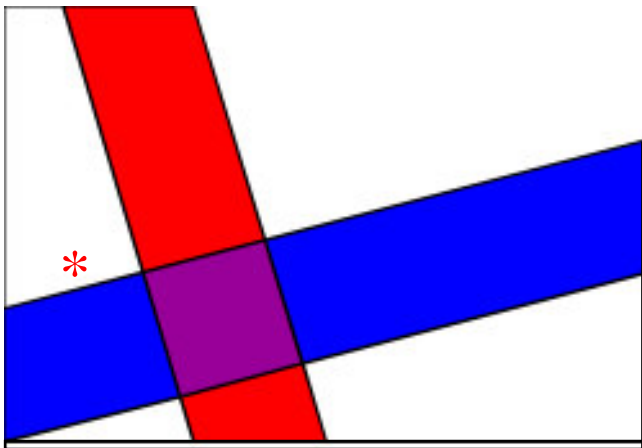


Using white, pick up one stitch from the end of each garter stitch ridge, on the edge shown (10 stitches)
 Next row: knit 5; Turn
 Next row: knit
 Next row: knit
 Leave stitches on a stitch holder

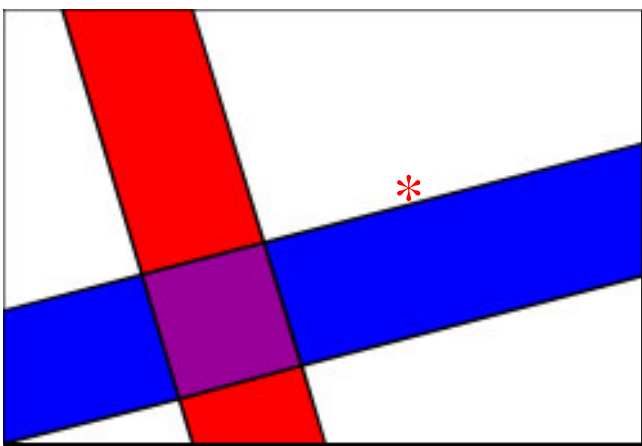




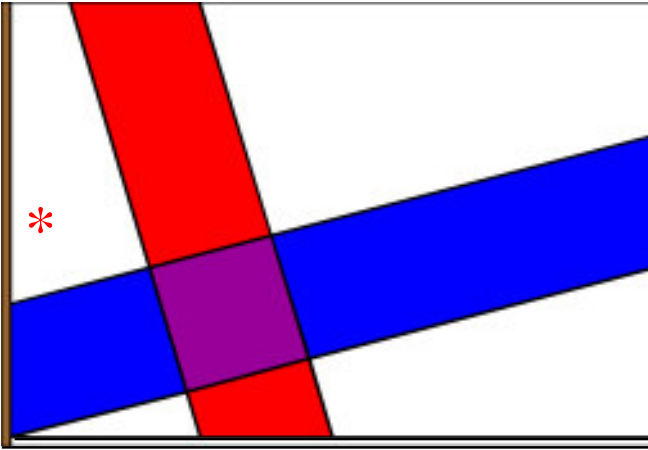
Using white, knit across all stitches from the 3 shapes on the edge shown
Cast off loosely



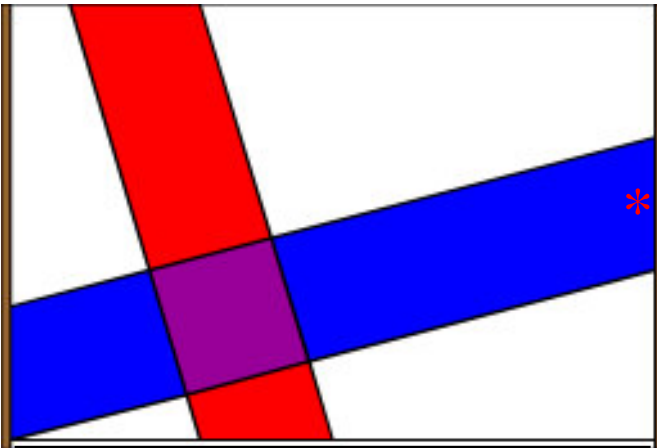
Using white, pick up one stitch from the end of each garter stitch ridge, on the edge shown (8 stitches)
Knit 29 more rows, knitting 2 together at the outer edge of rows 4, 10, 16, 22 and 28
Leave stitches on a stitch holder



Using white, pick up one stitch from the end of each garter stitch ridge, on the edge shown (21 stitches)
Knit 12 more rows, increasing one stitch at the outer edge of rows 4, 8, and 12
Next row: knit to last 4 stitches; Turn
Next row: knit
Next row: knit to last 8 stitches; Turn
Next row: knit
Next row: knit to last 12 stitches; Turn
Next row: knit
Next row: knit to last 15 stitches; Turn
Next row: knit
Next row: knit to last 18 stitches; Turn
Next row: knit
Next row: knit to last 21 stitches; Turn
Next row: knit
Next row: knit
Leave stitches on a stitch holder



Using brown, pick up 1 stitch from each ridge end of white and blue shapes and 1 stitch from narrow white ridge (24 stitches)
Cast off loosely



Using brown, pick up 1 stitch from narrow white ridge and 1 stitch from each ridge-end of white, blue, and white shapes (24 stitches)
Cast off loosely

Make another flag exactly the same OR work a plain back

Plain back

Cast on 34 stitches.

Knit 48 rows and leave stitches on a holder

At each side, using brown, pick up one stitch from each ridge end. Cast off loosely.

Use this piece in place of the second flag

In either case stitch the two pieces together by oversewing along the brown edges. Keep this seem as flat as possible.

Top

Using white, pick up 1 stitch from end of brown strip, knit across all stitches on stitch holder, pick up 1 from end of brown strip. Continue across the other flag in the same way (72 stitches)

Next row: knit

Next row: (knit 2 together, knit 7) 8 times (64 stitches)

Next row: knit

Next row: (knit 2 together, knit 6) 8 times (56 stitches)

Next row: knit

Next row: (knit 2 together, knit 5) 8 times (48 stitches)

Next row: knit

Next row: (knit 2 together, knit 4) 8 times (40 stitches)

Next row: knit

Next row: (knit 2 together, knit 3) 8 times (32 stitches)

Next row: knit

Next row: (knit 2 together, knit 2) 8 times (24 stitches)

Next row: knit

Next row: (knit 2 together, knit 1) 8 times (16 stitches)

Next row: knit

Next row: (knit 2 together) 8 times (8 stitches)

Break off yarn and thread through remaining stitches. Fasten securely.

Stitch all seams.

Flagpole(s)

Cast on 24 stitches. Work 7 rows of garter stitch. Cast off loosely and stitch into a tube.

Insert a pen or pencil (trimmed to size with a hacksaw if it is too long) and stitch both ends of the tube. Stitch a gold button to the top of the flagpole.

Place the flagpole exactly over the brown strip and stitch securely in place down both sides of the pole using stabbing stitches.

Display with pride



Materials

Approximately 50 metres of white Double Knitting yarn
Small quantities of purple, red, blue and brown Double Knitting yarn
2 ball point pens with refills removed OR 2 pencils without sharp points
2 small gold buttons

Equipment

Pair of needles possibly size 3.5 mm or 4 mm, depending on how loosely you knit (4 mm will be looser than 3.5 mm)
Two double pointed needles in approximately the same size
Stitch holder
Large sewing needle
